

I. High Seas Drift Net (HSDN) Enforcement

USCGC MORGENTHAU began patrolling the NPAFC Convention Area on 01 May. A Coast Guard C-130 deployed to Japan from 27 April-10 May and flew 83 hours in support of this mission. No HSDN vessels were detected by these flights. A Canadian CP-140 aircraft deployed to Japan on 11 May, and three personnel representing the Canadian Department of National Defense, and Department of Fisheries and Oceans, deployed to D17 to coordinate their operation.





On 19 May, the Canadian CP-140 sighted a fishing vessel rigged for large scale HSDN fishing. The FF/V YIN YUAN, was located transiting on the high seas, approximately 635 nautical miles east of Hakodate, Japan, and no fishing gear was sighted in the water. After several days of pursuit, USCGC MORGENTHAU was able to communicate with the vessel master who claimed

a Chinese flag. A joint boarding was conducted with Chinese Fisheries Law Enforcement Command (FLEC) ship riders from MORGENTHAU under the provisions of the U.S./P.R.C. Memorandum of Understanding on cooperative efforts to combat HSDN fishing. The vessel master admitted to throwing 3.3 km of drift nets, net tubes and net spreader overboard after the sighting of the vessel. China has agreed to seize the vessel and pursue prosecution for large scale HSDN fishing. USCGC MORGENTHAU is scheduled to



rendezvous with a Chinese Coast Guard Ship on 02 June southwest of Japan to transfer custody for the escort back to China. Additionally, the vessel was noted with 900-1200 lbs of frozen salmon on board at the time of the boarding. The cutter crew took random samples of the salmon and will forward these to NOAA for genetic testing.

Members of D17 Enforcement Branch participated in the NPAFC meeting in Portland, OR, from 12-16 May. During the meeting the 2014 HSDN patrol season was discussed. Additionally, the meeting highlighted the 2013 detection of the IUU vessel TAI JI, and the eventual interdiction by the Russian Border Guard. The Russian Border Guard seized the vessel with 599 tons of frozen squid and 136 tons of frozen saury on board.

II. U.S./Russian Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) Enforcement

Activity along the MBL was minimal over the reporting period due to extensive ice coverage. The Russian pollock season opened on 15 May, and fishing vessels are starting to fishin in the vicinity of the border. USCGC MELLON conducted a patrol along the MBL from 29-31 May. Results from that patrol pend. While activity is expected to be light, D17 expects fishing activity along the MBL to increase in June and July.

III. Steller Sea Lions (SSL) and Critical Habitat Enforcement

The Coast Guard monitors more than 151 critical habitat areas around the state as part of routine cutter and aircraft patrol activity. No violations of SSL critical habitat were detected over the reporting period.

IV. Fishing Vessel Boarding Statistics





Figure 2. Fisheries Violations by Year

There were 78 domestic fisheries and fishing vessel safety boardings conducted by the U.S. Coast Guard during the reporting period. These boardings resulted in a total of 11 safety violations on board eight vessels and one federal fisheries violation. Figures 2 and 3 show the historic trends for boardings and violations.

Figure 1. Fisheries Boardings By Year

V. Halibut and Sablefish

The Seventeenth District enforcement assets conducted 38 boardings on IFQ halibut or sablefish vessels during the reporting period with one violation noted by an AIRSTA Kodiak flight. F/V IRENE H was sighted running flatfish through a crucifier, and review of the video by USCG and NOAA enforcement personnel identified the fish as halibut, at least one of which was subsequently discarded. The vessel was issued a violation for failure to use careful release methods.

VI. Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety/Search and Rescue Cases

During the reporting period, 11 safety violations were detected on eight vessels. There were two voyage terminations during the reporting period, one for intoxication, and one for no buoyant apparatus. A comprehensive list of violations can be found in Appendix C.

There were 10 SAR cases, resulting in two lives saved. Appendix A provides a comprehensive list of search and rescue cases involving fishing vessels over the reporting period.

Figure 4. Annual HC-130 Hours





Figure 4. Annual Major Cutter Days

Figure 6. Apr - May HC-130 Hours





Figure 7. Apr - May Major Cutter Days
